Extraordinary Weather Creates Amazing Pictures

For the second time in what has been a frigid winter in the Northeastern United States, Niagara falls has come to an icy halt as the six million cubic feet of water that typically flow over the falls every minute has frozen over. The flow of water over the falls typically can withstand icy temperatures like those that have frozen much of the country this winter, but Monday's high of 9 degrees Fahrenheit



brought Niagara Falls to a standstill - and photographers were there to snap some stunning images of the frozen waterfall. In January, another record-breaking cold front managed to freeze the mighty falls in a 'polar vortex' that turned the cascading water to ice - and affected about 240 million people in the U.S. and southern Canada.

The UK Met Office says this winter has been historic as system after system have led to widespread flooding and wind damage that has reshaped shorelines. The BBC reports the United Kingdom has had its wettest winter since records began in 1910. Separate records for England and Wales show this season has seen more rainfall than any winter since rain-tracking began in 1766. The report also mentioned southeastern England has received more than twice the normal rainfall for



an average winter. More than 20 inches of rain have fallen in the UK from Dec. 1 through Feb. 24, the Met Office reported. The 30-year average rainfall for that time period, measured for winters between 1981 to 2010, is 13 inches. For Wales and England, the previous winter record of 16.6 inches of rainfall has already fallen, the Met Office announced. That record stood for 99 years. The region is at 17.1 inches of rain and counting for the winter.

Man Caught Trying To Exchange \$10,000 Notes

The Thai suspect, 39, was caught with 482 fake US\$10,000 banknotes last weekend.

Upon arrest, the suspect said he was promised a commission if he could exchange the fake notes for proper cash. Tourist Police Division's deputy commander Col Supaseth Chokchai said police had received a tip-off about the fake note gang and decided to stage an undercover operation to nail down the culprit. Police said the suspect would have got up to Bt144.6 million if he was able to exchange all the fake notes based on face value.

However, Supaseth said, the \$10,000 notes were no longer available in the market and before, they were only used for interbank transactions. "The biggest notes in the market now are \$100," he pointed out.



Nang Lerg Market

Officially launched on March 29, 1900 in Bangkok, this market has a long history and many time-tested food shops. Jibkee, for example, has served Grilled Duck, Roasted Red Pork, and Crispy Pork for more than a century now. Delicious dishes are also available at several less old eateries. For over four decades, Bamee Rungruang is famous for its homemade noodle that is topped with crab, roasted red pork, Chinese mustard green and wonton. Rungroj's menu, meanwhile, offers more than 60 dishes including must-try Steamed Duck in Soy Sauce.

Selling aromatic coffee and Sri Lanka tea, Salon de Café has attracted local and foreign customers alike. Visitors to this market can also stroll along rows of old-style shop houses and pay respect to Krom Luang Chumphon Khet Udomsak Shrine. The Nang Lerg Market opens from 10am to 2pm, and from 5pm to 11pm every day. However, there are usually fewer shops and stalls on Saturdays and Sundays.

Krabi villagers build bamboo barriers to protect the coast



After enduring huge waves and strong winds for the past few years, residents of a seaside village in the southern province of Krabi have adapted to the effects of climate change by using bamboo to build temporary barriers to prevent coastal erosion. The barriers were built along a 500-metre stretch of coastal area in the fishing community in tambon Klong Prasong, Muang district, last year to reduce the impact of huge, strong waves that erode the seashore and destroy residential areas. Located along the shore of an isolated island, Klong Prasong village has been faced with strong winds, huge waves

and rising sea levels, especially in monsoon season from June to November every year.

According to fisherman Sanit Rotkerd, 40, sea waves have eroded the coastal area by more than 1 kilometre. He and other villagers have been forced to relocate to higher land. "In my lifetime I have had to move twice because of [coastal erosion] caused by strong waves," he said. Previously, the village was surrounded by a beautiful sandy beach and mangrove forests, which protected residential areas from erosion. But since the sea waves have become stronger and more destructive, Sanit's land, about a kilometre from his current home, has been slightly eroded and submerged under seawater.

Another fisherman, Suradej Ornboot, 50, recounted a similar experience. He said the fierce winds and furious waves destroyed the mangrove forest where local villagers once obtained fish, seaweed and other food sources. "Since the mangrove forest was destroyed by the strong waves, it is really difficult to find food, not only for eating but also for making money," he said.



One of the most popular destinations for townies wanting to escape to the hills, Khao Yai in Nakhon Ratchasima has over the years become home to clusters of real estate built to resemble the Provencal ville and English mansion.

Italy too is present in Khao Yai with Primo Piazza, a Bt300-million development designed as a 500-year-old Tuscan village. Formerly known as Primo Posto, a restaurant and vineyard that opened back in 2007, it's been expanded and renovated

and is now home to Thai and Western restaurants, an ice cream & crepe parlor, a wine bar and souvenir shop.

Painted in the warm earth tones common to central Italy, it's a great place to chill both during the day and in the evening. The vineyards have been turned into a farm and sheep, donkeys and alpacas spend their days munching on the grass. There's even a tower, a popular spot with tourists and offering a 360-degree view of Primo Piazza and its surrounds.

Chookiat Ophaswongse, honorary president of the Thai Rice Exporters Association, said the rice-trading community has suspected for long that the deal to sell 1.2 million tonnes of rice was fake from the outset. When the National Anti-Corruption Commission (NACC) started investigations into the transparency of rice deals between Thailand and China, the government declared it was scrapping the deal to cut off any more investigations, he said.



“We are all aware that this deal was not real from the beginning, as the state enterprise is based in Harbin in northeast China, where people consume short-grain rice, while Thai rice is long grain,” Mr Chookiat said, adding that the enterprise had not been awarded a quota by China National Cereals, Oils and Foodstuffs Corporation (Cofco) to import long-grain rice.

Caretaker Deputy Prime Minister and Commerce Minister Niwatthamrong Bunsongphaisan said on Tuesday China had pulled out of the deal, adding only that China lacks confidence to do business with Thailand after the NACC started investigating. The government signed a contract last November to sell 1.2 million tonnes of 5% white rice on a government-to-government (G2G) basis to Beijing Great Northern Wilderness Rice Industry, a subsidiary of the state-owned Beidahuang Group, but the value of the deal was not disclosed. Nipon Puapongsakorn, a distinguished fellow at the Thailand Development Research Institute, said the deal revocation also possibly stems from the Chinese firm's fears of a serious penalty if it were found the deal was done without the central government's approval. An industry source said the Chinese government does not want to be cited in the Thai government's claim of G2G sales.

“As far as we're aware, the central government in Beijing was worried about a report of this rice deal with the Thai government and called the chairman of the group for interrogation,” he said. “The chairman said he had not acknowledged the deal, which was signed by the group's officials.” He said a G2G deal would be handled only by Cofco.

“The government has been playing a game for two years to mislead the people that it can sell its rice stocks on a G2G basis,” he said. “But that's a lie.”



Lumpini Boxing Stadium was founded in 1956 by Major General Prabhas Charusthira, while he was the commander of the 1st Brigade of the royal guards. The first boxing match was on March the 15th and the official opening ceremony was on December 8th of the same year. The boxing stadium has a long history and a lot of very important matches have been held there such as the first World Championship of Phone Kingpetch with Pascal Perez, on April 16, 1960. It has

also held Muay Thai and boxing championships of Thailand. On February 11th this year Lumpini stadium will be closed and moved from Rama IV Rd to the Thai Army Training Centre. On February 7th, Lumpini Boxing Stadium has organized a farewell boxing match which has many boxers participating.


Lord Berkeley, a former rail industry executive, has said (as per the Telegraph) that the Environment Agency was "looking after birds before humans".

Lord Berkeley said that the agency had not taken concerns about the railway seriously at a meeting.

"They said they could repopulate the beach, pump sand onto it to raise it up so the waves broke further out – but the birds would have to be looked after."

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Pattaya and Chonburi News



Pattaya's 50-strong Foreign Tourist Police Assistants (FTPA) have announced plans to expand their activities assisting the work of local tourist police superintendent, lieutenant colonel Aroon Promphan, throughout the city. Until recently, FTPA and a larger number of Thai volunteers have been largely restricted to helping tourists and sorting out public order problems in the busy Walking Street area. They operate principally from a mobile minibus unit which is stationed nightly until the wee hours. "We have already begun a motorbike patrol several times a week with Thai volunteers and the regular tourist police to offer a visual presence in other entertainment districts in Pattaya, Naklua and Jomtien," said FTPA group leader Wayne Walton. "There is radio contact with headquarters so that the team can be dispatched quickly to any trouble spot in the city." Agreement has also been reached to establish a second mobile office in the Soi Buakhao area to be operated by the tourist police and volunteers.



The national commander of the tourist police, major general Roy Inkapiroj stated recently that his force is around 2,000 officers short of the number necessary to deal with the kingdom's ever-growing tourist market especially from China, South Korea, India and the Middle East. He added that Thai and foreign volunteers were very important in this context. The FTPA in Pattaya has its own wide-ranging website at www.ftpapattaya.org. Applications to join are very welcome and full details are provided there.

Barry Kenyon, the FTPA media affairs officer, said a short in-house video of the work of FTPA was now being finalized and would be publicly available on the website and on YouTube next month. "We felt it was time to have our own short film on what we do and what we don't," he said. "Things are moving at a very fast pace right now."

Type 45 Destroyer HMS Daring sailed into Sattahip-Chuk Semat last month following a Christmas and New Year stand-down and maintenance period in Singapore, continuing her global deployment of wider regional engagement.

This is the first British ship to visit Thailand in five years to reinforce UK commitment in the region and build upon defense relations with Thailand—exemplified by establishment of a resident defense attaché as well as a recent visit by the General Sir Nicholas Houghton. The First Sea Lord, Admiral Sir George Zambellas, once again joins HMS Daring during this regional engagement, focusing on the development of Royal Navy to Royal Thai Navy (RTN) links.



The Department of Special Investigations (DSI) Eastern Branch, have begun a crackdown on Thai Tour Companies who are accused of illegally employing Russian Tour Guides. It is also thought that many of the companies are allowed to operate in such a way without fear of prosecution by Police. For this reason, complaints were made to the DSI who are the Thai equivalent of the FBI. They conducted investigations into various unnamed Tour Companies following complaints from Thai Tour Guides who claim that the Russians are employed in jobs they are more than capable of doing themselves.

In the early hours of Wednesday a total of 7 Russian Tour Guides were arrested in various locations, including Hotels and Tourist Attractions around the Pattaya and Banglamung areas. They were challenged to produce Thai Work Permits which they were unable to do. The Russians were transferred to various Police Stations around the Pattaya area depending on the location of their arrest and now face fines, imprisonment or deportation.


To demonstrate how difficult it had been to clean the mirrors, she asked the maintenance man to show the girls how much effort was required.

I changed my car horn to gun shot sounds.... People move out of the way much faster now.




